- **Dr. Olusola Adesope** (Hunsu, Nathaniel) US Department of Education via University of North Carolina. The Universal Writing Continuum Professional Development & Student Engagement Platform. This is a 3-year project with a budget of \$427,766 and F & A of 52%.
- **Dr. Michael Dunn** Pacific Foundation for Blind Children. Improving Writing Skills: The ARGUE Mnemonic Strategy for Creating Argumentative Texts. A 1-year project with a budget of \$5,166, without F & A.
- **Dr. Chad Gotch** National Science Foundation via the University of Central Florida. A framework for game-based teaching and assessment in middle school STEM courses for students with disabilities. This is a 3-year project with a budget of \$89,898 and F & A of 52%.
