- New results published in the Educational Administration Quarterly show Latinx educational leaders have a unique ability to understand social justice leadership, as well as support current and aspiring leaders of color who seek to promote equity in their work. This makes sense since many have lived experiences through childhoods and educational histories that are fraught with inequity. - A new grant is helping scientists dive deeper into the issue of how cannabis affects the brain and cognition. The research, led by assistant professor of kinesiology, **Shikha Prashad**, could help determine if the associated risks of cannabis warrant intervention strategies or changes in public health and policy surrounding cannabis use. The study is being done under the auspices of WSU's Alcohol and Drug Abuse Research Program.
