Strategies: Autonomy

Support student choice

 Evoke needs, preference, perspectives

Provide opportunities for leadership



Strategies: Competence

- Invite students to work on challenging and achievable tasks
- Support students in identifying strengths
- Provide opportunities for students to be in **expert roles**



Strategies: Relatedness

• Use **culturally responsive** strategies

 Notice and remember important information about your students
